MCELROY AND DRAVIS WIN KAKE GOLDEN APPLE AWARDS

Freeman Elementary School Pre-Kindergarten teacher Jennifer McElroy and Haysville West Middle School Sixth Grade Social Studies teacher Jonathan Dravis won KAKE Golden Apple Awards. Thirteen Haysville USD 261 teachers have received Golden Apples since the program began in October 2003.

DISTRICT RECEIVED BUS GRANT TO IMPROVE FUEL EFFICIENCY

Haysville USD 261 received a grant to improve the efficiency of its school bus fleet.

Under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Funding to Kansas for the National Clean Diesel Grant Program, Haysville USD 261 was awarded a contract totaling \$95,360.

The contract was used to purchase and install the Webasto 45000 BTU School Bus Heater in 40 of the District's big buses. These heaters are engineered specifically for school buses to reduce idling and save fuel.

AREA COLLEGES/UNIVERSITIES GIVE AWARDS TO USD 261 STAFF

As the Space Shuttle Program neared retirement, NASA was looking for ways to preserve the program's history and inspire the next generation of space explorers, scientists and engineers.

In December 2010, NASA offered 7,000 shuttle heat shield tiles to schools and universities across the country that wanted to share technology and a piece of space history with their students. The Duke University Talent Identification Program's (Duke TIP) 7th Grade Talent Search honored Haysville Middle School seventh grade student Zane Storlie and Haysville West Middle School seventh grade student Jonathan Fleming.

The Duke University Talent Identification Program's 7th Grade Talent Search identifies students in sixteen states in the Southeast, Midwest and Southwest who have scored in the 95th percentile on a grade-level achievement test.

GIFTED EDUCATION PROGRAM INCREASED NUMBERS SERVED

The USD 261 Gifted Education Program has continued to grow with teachers assisting gifted students by meeting their social/emotional, organizational academic, and motivational needs.

The number of students served district-wide has increased from 112 for the 2007 - 2008 school year to 171 for the 2010 - 2011 school year.

The Gifted Teachers Education Team recognizes the importance of involving the parents of gifted students. The USD 261 Special Education Department sponsors quarterly Parent Nights with guest speakers and informational presentations to educate the staff and our parents.

Gifted student and family activities have included a visit to Cow Town, Exploration Place, Corn Maze, Ropes Course and Cosmosphere.

The Gifted Teachers are very involved in the District's general education programs as well as the Battle of the Books, Scholar Bowl, Math Competition, Odyssey of the Mind, ACT test preparation and school and district Spelling Bees.

IN THE NEWS

•Campus High School's stellar Theatre program won two Jester Awards in May 2010. The Jester Awards are given by the Musical Theatre of Wichita to bring positive attention to area high schools for the excellence of the musical shows being produced on their campuses. The winners were: Outstanding Lobby Display (coordinated by Zach Bush) and Outstanding Scenic Design (Greg McGlynn). This was the fifth year Campus High School has won in this category.




USD 261 funds and resources are allocated to support student learning. District budgetary decisions are made to give students the best educational experience and opportunities.

The local assessed valuation continues to increase with residential and commercial development within the District.





•The school continued to have a fantastic Recycling Program which was utilized predominately for "Going Green" activities on the exterior of the building. Aluminum cans were collected and saved by parents and businesses. Box Tops were collected as well as other wrappers offering a rebate. Funds from these activities helped purchase shrubs and trees.
